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PROVINCIAL INDOOR AND OUTDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

ROTATION, AWARDING, MINIMUM VENUE ATTRIBUTES, AND ARCHERY ALBERTA SUPPORT

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PREAMBLE:

The intent of this policy is to provide a process for rotating and awarding Provincial Indoor and Outdoor Championship tournaments. Championship tournaments will be rotated between the Northern and Southern Alberta Zones to enable Clubs to plan well in advance of submitting bids to host Championship events when the event is scheduled to occur within their zone. Annually rotating the Championship events will also help to reduce travel time and costs for archers in alternating years, hopefully making it possible for more archers to attend more Championships, more frequently, and making these events better attended overall. To this end, this policy will also provide clubs with knowledge of:

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- Key factors and venue attributes that will support a club's ability to deliver an Indoor or Outdoor Championship,
- The kind of support clubs can expect from Archery Alberta to help them host Championship events, and
- What information should be provided to Archery Alberta in a bid to host a Provincial Championship.

DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this policy the following definitions apply:

1. **Alberta Games Zones** – For the purpose of determining what communities/clubs fall within the Northern or the Southern Alberta Zones, Archery Alberta will rely upon the Alberta Games Zones as Archery Alberta and most clubs are already familiar with these zones through archery's role in the Alberta Winter Games. For reference:
 - a. The [Alberta Games Map](#)
 - b. The [list of communities](#) that fall within each of the eight Alberta Games Zones
2. **Awarding process** – process by which a Provincial Championship is awarded to a Bid Club.
3. **Bid Club** – Any club (or clubs, if more than one club is working on a single, cooperative bid) that has submitted a bid to host one of the upcoming Provincial Championship events.
4. **Cadet Archer** – An archer between the ages of 15 to 17 years is a Cadet in any competition they shoot, in any year in which they fall within this age category.
5. **Host Club** – A club (or clubs - if more than one club is working together on a single, cooperative bid to host a Provincial Championship) that has been awarded the opportunity to host a Provincial Championship tournament.
6. **Northern Alberta Zone** – Comprised of Alberta Games Zones 5-8.
7. **Off Zone** – The Zone that hosted that championship in the previous year.
8. **On Zone** – The Zone that did not host that championship in the previous year.
9. **Rotation Process** – process by which Provincial Championships are rotated between Northern and Southern Alberta Zones each year.
10. **Southern Alberta Zone** – Comprised of Alberta Games Zones 1-4.

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PART A – ROTATION

Beginning in 2021, Archery Alberta will rotate all Provincial Championships between Northern and Southern Alberta Zones in alternating years.

PART B – AWARDING PROCESS

Single Bid to Host

No Vote is required when only a single, viable bid is received from a club located in the **On Zone** (the zone that did not host the championship in the previous year).

The Archery Alberta Executive will review the bid to ensure the club has demonstrated they are able to host the event. This review will, at a minimum, consider the following:

1. Timing of the event – does the proposed date conflict with other judged tournaments, or in a way that participation levels might be negatively impacted.
2. Event Venue – does the event venue identified in the bid have the capability of accommodating the necessary event(s) and/or the expected number of archers. (See “**Part C – Event and Venue Attributes**” for more details)
3. If the Archery Alberta Executive identifies potential issues with the bid (such as a timing conflict with another important competition), they will communicate those to the Bid Club to determine if the Club is willing and able to make sufficient changes to address the issues raised by Archery Alberta. If acceptable changes can be made by the Bid Club, the bid will be accepted, and the championship will be awarded to the Bid Club without the need for a vote.

Note, in the event that no bid is submitted from any club in the On Zone and only one bid is submitted to the Archery Alberta Executive by a club located in the Off Zone, no vote is required and the Archery Alberta Executive will follow the procedure noted above to ensure the club that submitted the only bid (in this case from the Off Zone) has demonstrated they are able to host the event.

Multiple Bids to Host

Voting to award a Championship **may be required** in two cases as follows:

1. Archery Alberta receives bids from more than one club in the On Zone. The Archery Alberta Executive will review all bids to ensure the bid clubs have demonstrated they are able to host the event. This review will consider the following:
 - Timing of the event – does the proposed date conflict with other judged tournaments, or in a way that participation levels might be negatively impacted.
 - Event Venue – does the event venue identified in the bid have the room and capability of accommodating the necessary event(s) and/or the expected number of archers.

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- If the Archery Alberta Executive identifies potential issues or concerns with any of the bids, they will communicate those with the Bid Clubs to determine if the affected Bid Club(s) is willing and able to make sufficient changes.
 - If it is determined that one or more Bid Clubs are unable or unwilling to make the necessary changes, those bids will be dropped from further consideration.
 - a. If only one viable bid remains, that will be the successful bid and no voting is required. The Championship will be awarded to the only remaining bid club with a viable bid in place.
 - b. If more than one viable bid remains on the table, the Archery Alberta Executive will consider the individual merits of those bids and will vote on awarding that Championship event at Archery Alberta's next executive meeting. Voting should be based upon:
 - i. each executive member's view on the overall quality and merits of the bids including whether or not any of those bids demonstrate greater benefit to the development of archery in Alberta over the longer term.
 - ii. A simple majority vote of the Archery Alberta Executive will determine which bid club is awarded the Championship event.
2. **Archery Alberta receives multiple bids from the "Off Zone" and no bids from the "On Zone"**. Again, Off Zone bids will only be considered if no "On Zone" bids have been received.
- The Archery Alberta Executive will follow the procedure outlined immediately above reviewing one or more bids and (in the case where there is more than one viable bid) voting on and awarding the Championship accordingly at an Archery Alberta executive meeting.

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Bid Submission Deadlines - for Indoor and Outdoor Championships

Tournament	Bid Submission Deadline
Indoor Target	May 15 of previous year
Indoor 3D	May 15 of previous year
Outdoor Target Field (same weekend)	October 15 of previous year
Outdoor 3D	October 15 of previous year

PART C – TARGET & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

General Recommendations

1. Ideally, food services of some kind should be available at site (at least on all full days of shooting) to limit potential delays associated with archers and/or their support people having to travel offsite for lunch. If food services can't be available at site, they should be located as close by as possible.
2. There should be sufficient availability of accommodations (camping, bed & breakfast, or hotel options) and preferably within 30 minutes of driving time from the event venue.
3. At a minimum, portable toilets (including wheelchair accessible toilets) must be available at site and located where archers can get to them as quickly as possible before and between rounds. The less time between rounds, the more washroom facilities need to be available to limit delays and maintain schedule.
4. Indoor and outdoor target championship venues must be wheelchair accessible.
5. Field championship venues are not required to be wheelchair accessible.
6. Clubs must register provincial target and field championships with Archery Canada (<https://archerycanada.ca/resources/ianseo-tournament-registration-system/>)

Match Play

1. Match Play has become a permanent component of the Alberta Winter Games, the Canada Winter Games, the Canadian National Championships, most US major tournaments, and all World Archery Tours and Championships.

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2. Beginning in 2024, Alberta Indoor and Outdoor Target Championships will also include Single Elimination Match Play events for Cadets and up in all Compound, Recurve, and Barebow divisions to ensure we build our sport and our athletes to help them become more competitive on the national and international level. This will be up to the discretion of the host society if they would like to take this on.
3. Including Single Elimination Match Play in all future Provincial Target Championships will also ensure regular opportunities to develop Provincial Judges with Match Play experience who will then be more able to step in and judge at other provincial, national, and international level shoots where Match Play is required.

Targets

1. Athletes in and above the Cadet category for Compound, Recurve and Barebow divisions, who wish to compete provincially, nationally, and internationally must be familiar with the correct target faces. Beginning in 2021, Provincial Target Championships will be conducted using the correct World Archery competition face for each Championship event for all Cadet and older competitors in the Compound and Recurve divisions.
2. Target Faces reference (World Archery Rule Book – Chapter 7 Field of Play Setup – Target Rounds):
 - Compound Archers:
 - i. for the Indoor Provincial Championship, archers may choose to shoot the full ten ring target or three spot target face. (host society can choose between vertical or triangle 3 faces, or combination of the two)
 - ii. For the Outdoor Provincial Championship, archers may choose to shoot a full ten ring 80cm target (they will be sharing that target with other archers) or, they may instead choose to shoot their own 5 ring 80cm target face: TA 6x80C.
 - iii. At the time of pre-registration, archers must identify their target choice. If archers show up without pre-registering, they may not be given the choice of a target face.
 - Recurve and Barebow Archers:

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- i. for the Indoor Provincial Championship, archers may choose to shoot a single face 10 ring target or the correct three spot target face. (host society can choose between vertical or triangle 3 faces, or combination of the two)
- ii. for the Outdoor Provincial Championship, will shoot the following target face: TA-122CM
- iii. At the time of pre-registration, archers must identify their target choice. If archers show up without pre-registering, they may not be given the choice of a target face.

In all cases, target faces used at Provincial Target Championships must be produced by a licensed World Archery manufacturer. Some licensed manufacturers are [Maple Leaf Press Inc](#) and [Lancaster Archery](#).

Outdoor Target Championship

Field of Play

1. Must be able to accommodate up to 4 archers on each butt at required distances from 20 to 90 meters for the Target Championship
 - a. It is **preferred** that there be only three archers shooting on each target butt.
 - b. If space becomes an issue and/or registrations are higher than expected and the available space and number of butts are limited to the extent that it is necessary to place four archers on a butt, accommodation for this is available.
2. A single, full-size outdoor soccer field is approximately 68 meters wide by 115 meters long. One soccer field can therefore accommodate the following for a 720 shoot:

Distance between archers	Number of archers per line	Number of Butts	Maximum Accommodation
1.25 M	48	24	96
0.8 M	74	37	148

This does not include the loss of any shooting lanes within the width of the soccer field due to needs associated with safety zones located on either side of, and behind, the field of play ([7.1.1.10 Suitable Barriers](#)).

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3. It is nice but not required to have two practice butts available for archers at each distance they are to shoot at during the competition.

Equipment categories

Archery Alberta will recognize all the same equipment categories as the field championships for the outdoor target championships. This is being done within the province to promote more crossover between the two events as they are held on the same weekend. (Following divisions: Compound, Recurve, Barebow, Compound unlimited, Hunter)

Format

- **Option 1** - Single 720 round followed by 3 round match play. All categories/age classes would be in match play as long as there are 2 or more archers. Only the top 5 archers would do the shoot off. 1st place qualifier will go straight to the gold medal match. 2nd place would go head to head against 5th, 3rd vs 4th. The winners would go onto the next round. The winner of the next match would go onto the gold medal match while the loser would be awarded bronze. At most events, to get through a 720 round would be 2.5hrs and 3 round match play would take 2-2.5 hrs. It does take time to verify scores and set the grids in between the 720 and match play. Multiple volunteers would be needed to help get this done quickly.
- **Option 2** - Double 720. Medals to be awarded based on the results of these two rounds.
- **Option 3** - A 1440 round, which would be shot over 1 day. Medals to be awarded based on results at the end of this round. 6-7 hrs with breaks/ moving targets.
- **Option 4** - A 900 round, which would be shot over 1 day. Medals to be awarded based on the results at the end of this round. 5-6 hrs.
- **Option 5** - A 1200 round, which will be shot over 1 day. Medals to be awarded based on the results at the end of the round. 5-6 hrs.

Option 3/4/5 will require a great number of volunteers to move the butts in between the various changes in distances.

Note: Provincial medals will still be awarded based upon the archer's official age category.

Field Championship

Field of Play

4. Must have a minimum of six practice butts available, with one each at 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, & 60 meters with applicable field targets on each.
5. Be able to provide archers with adequate shooting lane space as per (AC 7.1 FOP for target rounds) and be able to include a minimum of two appropriately spaced lanes for para-archers (placed as needed to accommodate those archers, once you know they have registered).

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Format

1. Field Round of 24 Targets or 2 x 12 targets (if the same 12 target course is used twice but this is NOT ideal) Host club can decide upon giving their bid if the event will be known, unknown or a combination of the two. If there are unknown and known on the same event, they must be shot at separate times. Unknown first then known after so that we don't have any conflicts.
2. Distances ranging from 5 meters to 60 meters.
3. The Field round location does not have to be at same venue as the 720; however, it should be within a reasonable travel distance from local accommodations being used by the participants.

Indoor Target Championship

Field of Play

6. You must provide a minimum of .8m of space for each archer and 1.25m of space for para-archers
7. If a variance from the .8 or 1.25 metre lane widths is required, this must be approved in advance by Archery Alberta and must be noted in the registration forms so that archers know in advance of any reduced lane widths.
8. you must have a 1 metre waiting line behind the shooting line.
9. Distance – 18 metres +/- 10cm

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Formats that host club can follow:

Option 1	Option 2	Option 3
Day one: WA 600 round	Day one: 2 Canadian 300 rounds	Day one: WA 600 round
Day two: WA 600 or 300 round Medals decided by both days combined scores.	Day two: Canadian 300 round. Medals decided by both days combined scores.	Day two: Single elimination match play based on qualifying score from day one, only for Male categories with more than 10, female more than 5.

Match play will only be for the top 16 in any category. It will be single elimination. Male categories must have minimum of 10 and female categories must have minimum of 5 in order to do match play. The host club must be able to run match play and if they need help with this will need to ask Archery Alberta for a technical delegate to help. It is suggested if space permits those categories U13 and under to shoot a 300 on the second day versus doing match play.

Part D – 3D CHAMPIONSHIPS

General Recommendations

1. Ideally, food services of some kind should be available at site (at least on all full days of shooting) to limit potential delays associated with archers and/or their support people having to travel offsite for lunch. If food services can't be available at site, they should be located as close by as possible.
2. There should be sufficient availability of accommodations (camping, bed & breakfast, or hotel options) and preferably within 30 minutes of driving time from the event venue.
3. At a minimum, portable toilets (including wheelchair accessible toilets) must be available at site and located where archers can get to them as quickly as possible before and between

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rounds. The less time between rounds, the more washroom facilities need to be available to limit delays and maintain schedule.

4. Indoor 3D venues must be wheelchair accessible. However, outdoor 3D championship venues are not required to be wheelchair accessible.
5. The format for Indoor and Outdoor 3D Championships will need to be approved by the board. IBO or ASA format can be used. All rules must be followed by the specific format. (categories, age classes)

If the ASA format is used, Provincial medals will be decided by cumulative score of the three rounds shot over the weekend. Shootout prizes will be in the form of a cheque from Archery Alberta. These cheques can be paid out to people from out of province as long as they are a member in good standing of AC or ASA. 1st - \$100 2ND -50 3rd - \$25. Must have the applicable number of archer as stated in the ASA rules in order to do a shootout.

The ASA Classic held at the end of the series will be considered the Outdoor 3d provincials.

Outdoor 3D Venue

1. Venues will vary widely in terms of topography and vegetation coverage.
2. 3D championship venues (outdoor) are not required to be wheelchair accessible.
3. Ideally, each target loop (of ~20-25 targets) will ideally be somewhere between 900 metres to 1.4 km in total length.

Outdoor 3D Format (AC 4.5.7.0 3D Rounds):

DAY ONE	Two rounds of 20 x 3D targets
DAY TWO	Minimum one round of 20 3D targets
MAXIMUM DISTANCE	50 yards / 45 meters
The Host Club will need three courses of at least 20 targets each for this Championship	

Historical number of archers for Outdoor 3D Championship

General Historical Outdoor 3D Participants
~ 72 to 146

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Indoor 3D Venue

1. A typical indoor riding arena is usually 24 m wide by about 60m long and can usually accommodate two courses of 20-30 targets. This space is a bare minimum as it is very tight. It has been done but it is not ideal.
2. Must include additional closer targets for younger archers to be able to provide them a similar 20-30 shots.
3. While there is enough room to allow up to 30 archers on the line at one time (in a riding arena with ~.8m of space for each archer), having one group of 4-6 archers lined up to shoot at each shooting position means you have room to accommodate from 120 to 180 archers per round in a typical riding arena. Again, this venue has a bare minimum of space and is not ideal.

Indoor 3D Format

DAY ONE	Two rounds of 20 3D targets
DAY TWO	Minimum one round of 20 3D targets
DISTANCE	50 yards / 45 meters
The “course” will remain the same throughout.

PART E – ARCHERY ALBERTA SUPPORTS FOR HOST CLUBS

Archery Alberta is able to provide the following support to Clubs that host Provincial Championships.

3D Targets

Archery Alberta has one trailer containing 3D targets

1. There are approximately 60 targets stored in the trailer.
 - While this is likely enough targets to cover most of your needs for a 3D Championship, you should ensure you have additional targets at your disposal to ensure you have enough to set up 2-3 challenging courses with sufficient variety in target sizes from small to large. **There are currently no ASA targets available for use outside of the ASA tour.**

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2. There is a \$750 deposit required for the use of the 3D target trailer. If the trailer and contents are returned in good condition and neatly stacked in the trailer, the deposit is returned to the Club.

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Target Butts

Archery Alberta has three trailers holding target butts and stands:

Trailer	Stock	Accommodation	Maximum capacity
#1	25 Danage target butts and stands	Four (4) Archers	100 Archers
#2	12 block targets (48" x 48") and stands	Four (4) Archers	48 Archers
#3	13 block targets (48" x 48") and stands	Four (4) Archers	52 Archers

1. Combined, this target butt inventory can accommodate up to 200 archers during a Championship. As noted earlier, it is still preferred that each butt accommodate only 3 archers.
2. There is a \$750 deposit required for the use of each target trailer. If the trailers and contents are returned in good condition with contents neatly stacked in the trailer, the deposit is returned to the Club.

Match Play Scoreboards

Archery Alberta will supply Match Play scoreboards for use in target Championship Match Play. Forty of these scoreboards will be stored in the two target butt trailers (twenty cards in each trailer) for use at both the indoor and outdoor championship events.

Financial Grant

Archery Alberta will provide a host Club with a grant to help offset club costs associated with the championship. The grant is awarded as follows:

- \$1000 if participation is under 100 archers; or
- \$1500 if participation is 101 or more archers.

Scoring - Results

- Clubs are responsible for entering results into the appropriate national database (currently Ianseo).

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- Results must be submitted to Archery Alberta within seven days of the end of the championship.
- Archery Alberta is developing a template for use when submitting these results.

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Other Supports

- Archery Alberta provides the judges.
 - Clubs are expected to pay the judges an honorarium. Alberta has set a standard that all judges get paid \$50 per day at an event. Judges will be letting us know if they are not being paid and the club could get billed for this by Archery Alberta.
 - Judges should not be out of pocket for basic expenses incurred to judge at a provincial championship (E.g. accommodations, meals, travel costs like mileage if judges have to travel a long distance).
- Archery Alberta is developing a pre-registration template for provincial championships that will include an archer's target face choice and if they require para-archer access.
- Archery Alberta can also provide your championship with a "Technical Advisor" (often this would be one or more as necessary of the Archery Alberta 3D Director, FITA Director, or the Judges Coordinator).

PART E – CHAMPIONSHIP DATES

Dates for Provincial Championships for Target and 3D should be selected with several things in mind. For example:

1. Proposed dates should try to avoid conflicts with other important registered competitions in Canada and in the US that are annual, longstanding events, in terms of the typical range of dates on which they are held. Especially when those registered tournaments are considered important for Alberta's top competitive archers, be they Target archers or 3D archers, and
2. Indoor Championships should be scheduled (especially for Target archers) early enough in the year to avoid forcing competitive archers to have to switch back to their indoor set-ups after they have already switched to outdoor set-ups and started their training and competing for outdoor events for the current year.

Here are some general and specific considerations that should be investigated by Bid Clubs in advance of choosing dates for their events to avoid conflicts with other important annual competitions:

1. For Outdoor Championships, consider the following:
 - a. Canadian 3D/Field/Target Nationals usually held in August.
 - b. Suggest hosting all Provincials in July. 1st or 2nd weekend Field/Target Provincials and 3rd or 4th weekend 3D Provincials.

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- c. NOTE: Due to the irregular Canadian Nationals dates for 2021 suggest hosting all Provincials in August. Potentially 1st or 2nd weekend for Field/Target Provincials and 3rd or 4th weekend for 3D Provincials.
 - d. Canada Cup (now called Canada Cup West) usually held May long weekend (though being held in June in 2021 and no bid yet for 2022).
 - e. Spring Classic (now called Canada Cup East) usually held the 3rd weekend of June (though no bids yet for 2021 or 2022).
2. For Indoor Championships, consider the following:
- a. Canadian Indoor 3D Nationals dates range from February to April so difficult to hold 3D Provincials consistently before.
 - b. Indoor Regionals are always held the first weekend of March.
 - c. Suggest hosting Indoor Target Provincials in the second half of February.
 - d. Suggest hosting 3D Provincials in the second half of March (unless conflicts with 3D Nationals).
 - e. Alberta Winter Games are usually held in even years on the February Long Weekend. Archery Alberta will not approve a provincial championship on the same weekend as the Alberta Winter Games.
 - f. The Vegas Shoot is usually held on the second weekend in February. This would not be a good choice for a provincial championship event.

PART F - CHAMPIONSHIP BIDS (CONTENT REQUIREMENTS)

Club bids to host a Championship must provide/include the following information:

1. Club Name(s): If this is a cooperative/joint bid, include the names of all clubs who are jointly submitting the bid to host the Championship.
2. Which Championship you are bidding to host.
3. Proposed dates to host the Championship, and whether or not you are able to be flexible on those dates.
4. State the Club's "Alberta Zone" (Northern or Southern Alberta).
5. Is your Zone is scheduled to host this championship in this year (Yes or No).
6. Is pre-registration required? Provide details on how registration will be managed.
7. Prices for registration.

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8. Location details – Please provide:
 - the location of all your venue(s)
 - a description of the proposed venue(s)
 - the capacity at each venue for: parking, number of archers, and the number of spectators that can be accommodated
 - links to any official website(s) for any of the venues you plan to rent (E.g., for an Indoor Championship)
9. Provide details on how you propose to manage food services and washroom facilities.
10. Provide a tentative schedule for the Championship including; check-in, inspections, practice, scoring rounds, lunch breaks, medal presentations, and any others that apply.
11. Provide an idea of the accommodation types and capacity in the vicinity of the venue(s) and approximate travel times to your venue from those accommodations, and
12. Provide any information you can on any legacy outcomes you might hope to achieve as a result of hosting this Championship.\
13. Please provide the option in which you would like to use for hosting the Target Championships.
